MESSAGE FROM THE MAYOR



Welcome to the 2022 Waste and Recycling Calendar

On behalf of Council, we are very proud of all that has been done to keep Newmarket clean and green as we continue to advance Council's Priority in Environmental Stewardship. This past year, together, we:

- Officially banned the use of single-use plastics such as plastic cutlery, straws, stir sticks and black plastic at all Town facilities and events in an effort to further our commitment to the environment.
- Purchased a water trailer that will be used at Town events for residents to refill their reusable water bottles. The use of the water trailer is expected to replace approximately 2,000 plastic water bottles each time.
- Continued to advance the Town's Urban Forestry Management plan by planting and protecting trees to expand Newmarket's tree canopy.
- Successfully hosted a community clean-up that focused on keeping our green spaces, parks and trails clean. Over 100+ kits were given out for this self-guided event.

- Continued to implement programs that make Newmarket a leader in the implementation of low impact design (LID).
- Continued to reduce greenhouse gases (approx. 386,205 kg to date) through use of 2900+ solar panels installed on eight Newmarket facilities since its installation.

These are just a few green initiatives that we accomplished as a community. You can help this cause further by continuing to reduce, reuse and recycle where possible, eliminate the use of single-use items/plastics and switch to reusable alternatives. Our actions collectively will save energy, reduce deforestation and minimize greenhouse gas emissions.

We look forward to doing more in 2022 and beyond. To participate in upcoming green initiatives, check our website regularly at newmarket.ca/ecoevents

COLLECTION REMINDERS







Place waste containers at the curb by 7 a.m. on your scheduled collection day, but not earlier than 5 p.m. the night before.

Remove emptied containers and any uncollected waste from the curb by 8 p.m. on collection day.

Do not place waste containers on the roadway or sidewalk or on top of or behind snow banks during the winter.





TEXTILE RECYCLING PROGRAM

The Town of Newmarket's textile recycling program, in partnership with Diabetes Canada, helps support textile diversion in our community. This program accepts all adult and children's clothing and footwear, as well as household textiles such as towels, pillows, and curtains. Accepted items include textiles that are worn, torn or stained.

All donated textiles must be dry and free of any medical or hazardous liquids.

BLUE BOX COLLECTION







Reminders:

- · Blue box collection occurs weekly.
- Containers should be empty, clean and free of food before placing in your blue box.
- Maximum weight per blue box is 22 kg (50 lbs).
- Use Town-approved blue box containers only. Blue boxes must not exceed 22 gallons (83 L) in capacity.
- Oversized containers and containers with attached lids and/or wheels are not accepted containers.
- Recyclables placed in any type of plastic bag will not be collected.
- Flatten and bundle cardboard and place on top of or beside your blue box. Bundles must not exceed 36" x 36" x 8".
- Shredded paper is not accepted in the blue box.
 Small amounts can be placed in your green bin.
 Large amounts can be taken to select York Region waste depots. Please visit york.ca/wastedepots for more information.



These items DO NOT belong in your blue box:

Plastic bags, plastic overwrap, plastic sleeves from newspapers, Styrofoam, clothing, furnace filters, toys, paper towels, takeout cups, plastic straws, black plastic and single-use masks and gloves.

Helpful Tips to Reduce Blue Box Litter in your Neighbourhood!

- Place heavier recyclables on top of lighter ones to keep them from blowing away, especially on windy days.
- Flatten all boxes.
- Place blue boxes at the curb on the morning of collection rather than the night before.
- Make sure items placed in the blue box belong in there.
- Do not place blue boxes on the roadway or on top of snow banks during the winter.
- Use additional blue boxes to avoid overflow.
 There is no limit to the number of blue boxes you can place out for weekly collection.
- Consider making a trip to a York Region waste depot to dispose of extra blue box recyclables for free (see page 3).



GREEN BIN COLLECTION







Reminders:

- Green bin collection occurs weekly.
- Remove all plastic packaging and overwrap from food before placing in your kitchen catcher or green bin.
- Material placed in the green bin must be in a securely tied bag.
- Use certified compostable bags to line your green bin or kitchen catcher.
- Maximum weight per green bin is 22 kg (50 lbs).
- Use Town-approved green bins only. Green bins must not exceed 12 gallons (45 L) in capacity.

- Cigarette butts
- Coffee pods
- Cotton balls
- Cutlery (plastic, metal, bamboo, compostable)

- Dryer lint
- Dryer sheets







YARD WASTE COLLECTION

Reminders:

- Yard waste collection occurs every other week from April to November
- Place weeds, plant trimmings and leaves in Kraft paper bags or an open-top garbage container that has two open, rigid handles and is marked with a yellow "Yard Waste" sticker. Yard waste stickers are available for free at the Newmarket Municipal Offices and Robert N. Shelton Operations Centre.
- Yard waste set out for collection in plastic bags, cardboard boxes, blue boxes, green bins or unmarked containers will not be collected
- Use twine to bundle branches. Bundled branches must not exceed 4 ft. in length, 2 ft. in diameter or 4" in diameter per branch.
- Maximum weight per container is 22 kg (50 lbs). Includes bundles.

- Corn stalks

- Flowers
- Hay and straw
- Leaves

- Plants
- Pumpkins
- Weeds

- Animal waste

Grasscycling

Leaving grass clippings on your lawn after you mow is a good practice in producing a healthier-looking lawn. Grasscycling helps retain moisture in your lawn and reduces the need for fertilizer by returning valuable nutrients back into the soil.

Backyard Composting





- Butterfly or orange milkweed ideal for normal-to-drought tolerant gardens

Protect your trees from European gypsy moth / Lymantria dispar dispar (LDD) this year. Prior to caterpillars hatching in spring, egg masses can be scraped off of trees into a bucket of soapy water and left for a day or two before disposing of them.

If trees are severely infested (many egg masses are visible), an insecticide may be a viable option. Contact a licensed tree

care company to discuss the best options.

Always wear gloves when handling caterpillars and egg masses to avoid an allergic reaction.



FIGHT THE BITE! AGAINST BLACKLEGGED TICKS AND LYME DISEASE

What is Lyme disease?



Lyme disease is caused by a bacteria called Borrelia burgdorferi which is spread through the bite of an infected blacklegged tick.

Symptoms of Lyme disease may include:

A skin rash
 Fever or chills

· Fatigue or

weakness

- Dizziness or confusion
- Muscle and joint pain
- Headache
 Swollen lymph nodes

See your health care provider if you develop symptoms of Lyme disease after a tick bite or after visiting a wooded or brushy area.


What are blacklegged ticks?



- Ticks are small bugs that feed off the blood of animals and humans
- Adult ticks are the size of a sesame seed and nymphs are the size of a poppy seed
- Ticks are found on tall grasses and bushes in wooded areas
- They can attach and feed up to five days

Protect yourself in wooded or brushy areas

- Wear light-coloured, long-sleeved clothing and closed footwear
- Use insect repellents containing DEET or icaridin
- · Walk in the middle of trails
- · Shower when you get home
- Check yourself, your family and your pets for ticks
- Remove attached ticks as soon as possible



If you find a tick on you or a family member remove it quickly



- Grasp the tick with tweezers as close as possible to your skin and pull it straight out
- Do not put anything on the tick or try to burn it off
- Disinfect the area with rubbing alcohol



- Choose items that have reusable or refillable features.

What are single-use items?


Single-use items are items that are typically used once and then discarded.

Examples include plastic straws and cutlery, plastic shopping bags, take-out cups and containers, and Styrofoam. Try to avoid single-use items where possible or replace with eco-friendly alternatives!



Reduce - Reuse - Recycle

- Bring reusable shopping bags
- Carry a reusable water bottle and take it with you while on the go
- Pack reusable cutlery



 Use reusable food wrap (or learn to make your own) instead of plastic cling wrap to package food











What is West Nile virus? West Nile virus is spread to humans from the bite of an infected mosquito.


How to protect yourself when outdoors

- Wear light-coloured, long-sleeved shirts and pants
- Use insect repellents containing DEET or icaridin
- Cover up at dusk and dawn when mosquitoes are most active



How York Region protects you

York Region's West Nile Virus Program includes larviciding over 100,000 catch basins during the summer and using mosquito traps to capture and test for West Nile virus infected mosquitoes.



Mosquito-proof your home

- Clean up areas of standing water around your home
- Ensure door and window screens are tight-fitting and in good repair
- Clean up pools / pool covers
- Turn over wading pools
- · Empty out flower pots
- Clear eavestroughs, storm and roof gutters
- · Clean bird baths weekly
- Empty water in old tires



What is Household Hazardous Waste?



Household hazardous waste (HHW) is anything in your home that is corrosive, explosive, flammable or poisonous and is no longer needed. It should be brought to a HHW depot where it will be disposed of safely.

Examples of HHW:

- Aerosol cans (full or partially full)
- Batteries
- Cleaning products
- Cosmetics
- Fertilizers
- Fluorescent light bulbs and tubes
- Gasoline (containers may not be returned)
- Glues and adhesives
- · Nail polish and polish remover
- · Paints (liquid and solid)

- · Paint thinner and varnish remover
- · Perfume and cologne
- Pesticides, insecticides and herbicides
- Pharmaceuticals
- Propane cylinders/tanks
- Pool chemicals
- Sharps (needles/syringes) must be in puncture proof container
- · Used motor oil and filters

Residents can drop off 60L of household hazardous waste and 20 compact fluorescent tubes per household per day.

What is Electronic Waste?



Electronic waste (e-waste) is any electronic equipment in your home that no longer works and cannot be repaired. E-waste should not be thrown in the garbage as these items contain materials considered to be hazardous.

Examples of e-waste:

- Cables
- · Cameras and camcorders
- Cell phones, telephones, pagers and fax machines
- Computer towers, laptops, tablets, modems, keyboards and mice

- · Game systems
- Monitors, printers, scanners and typewriters
- Televisions
- VCRs, DVD players, radios, stereos, speakers

Maximum 50 kg per household per day. Remove all packaging and batteries. Disassembled electronics will not be accepted.





GARBAGE COLLECTION

- A maximum of three garbage bags or containers will be collected bi-weekly.
- Additional garbage bags and/or containers, up to a maximum of three, must have a Town of Newmarket garbage tag affixed.
 Place tag around the neck of the bag or on the top garbage bag if inside a container. Tags must be visible.
- Garbage tags are available for purchase from locations listed on page 1.
- Garbage containers must not exceed 125 litres (33 gallons) in size and must have two open, rigid handles and a removable lid.

- Maximum weight per garbage bag or container is 22 kg (50 lbs).
- Garbage bags placed at the curb must be securely tied.
- Loose material must be contained in securely tied bags within containers.
- Do not use ties or bungee cords to secure lids on containers.
- Place sharp items such as broken glass, ceramics or mirrors separately in a cardboard box that is safely secured and clearly labelled "Broken Glass".
- Toilets (with tank and bowl drained and separated) can be placed at the curb as one item towards the three item limit.

Electronic Waste (E-waste) items are NOT collected at the curb and should not be thrown in the garbage as they contain valuable resources and hazardous materials that need to be recycled and disposed of properly. E-waste can be taken to select York Region waste depots (see page 13). Limits apply.











Household Hazardous Waste (HHW)

is anything in your home that is corrosive, explosive, flammable or poisonous and must be disposed of properly. Residents can drop off HHW at select York Region waste depots (see page 13). Limits apply. Info: york.ca/hhw





















METAL & LARGE ITEM COLLECTION



Large (Bulky) Items:

- Items such as furniture, mattresses, box springs, office chairs and other large items can be placed curbside for collection on your scheduled garbage collection day provided a large item tag has been attached to each item.
- Large item tags are available for purchase at most Town facilities (see page 1 for a list of locations).



Large Metal Items:

- Large metal items such as appliances, BBQ's (no propane tanks), metal bath tubs, bicycles and hot water tanks require a large item tag and are collected by appointment only.
- To arrange for curbside collection, residents must first purchase a large item tag and then call GFL (Green for Life) at 1-866-421-5625. If a special collection is not booked, metal items will not be collected.
- For safety reasons, please remove doors from fridges, freezers, dishwashers and ovens.



Additional Information:

Large items, appliances, large metal items and scrap metal can be dropped off at select York Region waste depots for disposal (fees may apply – visit york.ca/wastedepots for more information).



Tires

Tires are not collected curbside. Tires can be dropped-off at select York Region waste depots (see page 3) or participating retailers (limits apply). Drop-off locations:

Carpet and Linoleum

Carpet and linoleum can be placed curbside on your scheduled garbage collection day provided it is cut up and securely tied in bundles weighing less than 22 kg (50 lbs) each and measuring no longer than 1.5 m (4 ft.). Each bundle counts as one item towards the three item limit.



Renovation Waste

Renovation waste such as concrete, drywall, wood, doors, windows, etc. is not collected curbside.






